

Overview

An activity using <u>myworldofwork.co.uk</u> to link the study of English and the topic of reflective writing to possible careers.

Objectives

As part of a wider lesson, this lesson insert intends to:

 Make a link between the skills developed in reflective writing practice and the skills needed for the world of work

My World of Work activity (20mins)

- Arrange pupils in groups of two or three
- Go to <u>myworldofwork.co.uk</u>
- Go to <u>My career options</u>
- Ask pupils to review the section titled '<u>Show off your skills</u>'
- Hand out the thinking about skills checklist (one for each pupil) and ask the groups to agree and tick off the skills they think are developed in reflective writing activities
- Ask pupils to work on their own to think about their own personal skills and use the checklist to tick the skills they feel confident with

Connect the learning (in the wider lesson)

- Discuss some typical jobs that use reflective writing like writer, journalist, teacher or professor/lecturer (see job links below)
- Discuss how the skills learned in reflective writing are transferable to the workplace for many other jobs, e.g.:
 - Written communication skills/report writing
 - Use of professional language/vocabulary
 - Problem solving and analytical skills
 - Self-awareness knowledge of strengths and weaknesses
 - Ability to learn from experience
 - Skills for continued professional development (many professions require you to keep reflective logs alongside evidence of achievement for professional accreditation, chartership etc)
- Discuss how confidence in reflective writing (writing about yourself and your experiences) relates to completing CVs and application forms for jobs

Review and reflect (5mins)

Ask pupils to reflect on the skills they have ticked for reflective writing versus the skills they
have ticked for themselves. Are there any of the reflective writing skills that they feel they
need to further develop?

Communication is the ability to openly and honestly share information in a way that creates mutual understanding about thoughts, intentions and ideas between all parties involved.

Leading

Leading is the ability to lead others by inspiring them with a clear vision and motivating them to realise this.

Innovation – Create our own change

Curiosity


Curiosity is the desire to know or learn something in order to inspire new ideas and concepts.

Sense making

Sense making is the ability to determine the deeper meaning or significance of what is being expressed and to recognise wider themes and patterns in information and situations.

Critical thinking

Critical thinking is the ability to evaluate and draw conclusions from information in order to solve complex problems and make decisions.
